Authentication options for Taylor & Francis Online

The [guide on Taylor & Francis Online](#) details the many ways you can help library users to access journal content remotely, including institutional IP ranges, proxy servers, SAML solutions, and Google CASA. Today this has been updated to include a new site development, enabling users to access their institution's holdings through their individual Taylor & Francis Online account. Supporting access to eBooks through partners

We are working with several partners to support access to our ebooks and etextbooks. We are providing free access to ebooks through [VitalSource](#), Kortex (in conjunction with [JISC](#)), and [RedShelf](#) through the remainder of the Spring 2020 semester. This access is available to students whose campus has closed, and who therefore cannot access core textbooks from their libraries.

In addition, Taylor & Francis is participating fully with ProQuest, EBSCO, Dawsonera, Gardners and Bibliu to extend single user and 3 user eBook licences to unlimited user licences at no charge until the end of the current semester (June).

Access to COVID-19 resources

We are working hard to ensure that all research findings and data relevant to COVID-19 are shared rapidly and openly to inform the public health response and ultimately help save lives. This includes the launch of a resource center, bringing together [COVID-19 journal and book resources](#), which is being updated regularly to ensure that we are making all COVID-19

research free to access at the point of publication.
